NOTE FROM THE **ISSUE EDITOR**

I have a bottle of "Ollie's World's Best Bar-B-Q Sauce" sitting in my office. I'm not sure how it tastes; it's never been opened. In fact, I've never tried anything from Ollie's Barbecue. Nor did I ever visit the notorious restaurant before it closed its doors in 2001. That isn't the point.

In 1964, the U.S. Supreme Court unanimously upheld the Civil Rights Act and rejected Ollie McClung's argument that Congress could not regulate his restaurant by requiring desegregation. Based on the Constitution's Commerce Clause, the court held that Congress had the power to enact a statutory scheme necessary to combat race discrimination.

Setting aside an academic debate regarding the Commerce Clause's reach—whether applied to a barbecue joint in Birmingham, a bushel of wheat, gun-free school zones or marijuana production—the court in Katzenbach v. McClung reached the good result. My unopened bottle of barbeque sauce is a reminder of that (and of my sad attempts to answer questions about the case during my first year of law school). It reminds me of the good that can be done in our nation of laws, and of the role judges and attorneys play in realizing that good.

Certainly, our profession and the rule of law are things to be grateful for and celebrate this Thanksgiving season. We, at the Nevada Lawyer, hope you will enjoy this month's issue focused on Constitutional Law. NL
